People from different religions make pilgrimages to sites which have a deep spiritual significance. Muslims travel to Mecca, Jewish people go to the western wall in Jerusalem, Sikhs visit the Golden Temple in Amritsar in India and Catholic Christians might go to Lourdes. There are special beliefs and stories as to why these places of pilgrimage have developed. The reasons for pilgrimages vary but might include obedience, an opportunity to remember or reflect or to repent (say sorry). Going on a pilgrimage is symbolic of making a journey and progress in life. We will explore how this makes an impact on peoples' lives.
