Powerful knowledge

- Many people in Benin either worked as builders or worked the land. The role of the farmers included jobs like clearing the forests, planting crops and looking after animals.
- The Obas were very powerful and were treated like gods, during their rule the Benin Kingdom expanded its boundaries.
- Over time there were arguments about who would be the next Oba and this lead to civil wars. British troops invaded and gained control.
- The success of Benin was fuelled by its lively trade. Tradesmen and artisans from Benin developed relationships with the Portuguese, who sought after the kingdom's artwork, gold, ivory, and pepper. In the early modern era, Benin was also heavily involved in the West African slave trade.
- The golden age is a period in time when great tasks were accomplished. During the golden age of the Kingdom of Benin, they had great achievements in art, science, literature and philosophy.
- O A desire for control over West African trade and territory ultimately led to a British invasion of Benin in 1897. Benin City was burned by the British, who then made the kingdom part of British Nigeria (which became Nigeria after the country gained independence in 1960).
